new playhouse, The boxoffice is approached directly from the street. Inside double swinging doors is the lobby. The winding stairway leading up to the mezzanine floor and the balcony is entered from the lobby. After passing through me double doors one enters the foyer at

the theater proper. Four Aisles Lead In

The doors separating the foyer and he lobby are made of heavy walnut and are in keeping with the interior decorations. Deep grooves line their surface, giving them a weather-beaten ppearance. Small opennigs near the

op are barred with iron gratings. Four aisles lead from the foyer to he orchestra seats, two from the ends f the foyer and two between. The foyer foor as well as the aisles is covered with a heavy carpet. To aid patrons in finding their places each end seat is itted with a light which illuminates the floor. The seats are upholstered in red leather and are made comfortable with thick padding and springs. The backs of the seats are also leather up-

Opportunities for carrying out th Spanish effect in the mezzanine floor are even greater than in the foyer. Here the designer of the theater has let his fancy take full flight. Here and here patches of red brick appear, as brough the plaster had fallen from he walls. A niche in the wall is levery adapted to hold a drinking

Emergency Exits

Although there is nothing to hamper visibility from the lower floor one obtains a better prospectus of the theater from the balcony. There is no second balcony in the Palace.



After the demise of the Wigwam, there was a period of several years during which Marion had no theater of any description. Realizing that entertalnment was necessary for the city's welfare and progress, a group of pub-He-spirited citizens organized finally and decided to erect and equip a suitable playbouse.

Grand Is Built. The result was that about in 1895 the Grand Opera House was built. It was an expensive venture for the investors, none of whom ever realized any profits. The house, it was said, was too large and costly for the city's Prominently identified with the

Grand Opera House project were Amos. H. Kling, C. C. Stoltz, T. J. McMurray, Henry Strelitz and Edward Huber. For approximately 20 years the Grand Opera House kept Marion on the theatrical map. Following its destruction by fire, there was again another period in which the city was without a place for stage performances of sizeable proportions.

The city's need was finally supplied about 13 years ego when Marion Lodge of Elks purchased the site of the Grand Opera House and what was left of the building and arranged for reconstruction. The present Elks' home and Grand Theater was the outcome of

Throughout all of these years, Marion held the reputation of being a "good show town," that is, a place where high class attractions were almost certain to be well patronized. As a consequence, managers never hexitated to bring the best and largest shows

In the days of the old Apollo Hall. there appeared here such performers as Alf Bennett, a femous comedian of a half century ago, Ada Murray and her distinguished husband, George Ober, J W. THREE SWITCHBOARDS CONTROL ALL LIGHTS

Four Huge "Spots" Flash
Thousands of Candlepower Onto Stage

Three separate switchboards, one a master suppling current to the other two, will control all the lighting effects of the Palace theater.

Perhaps the most complicated of all these and upon which the success of the stage and auditorium lighting effects depends is located to the left of the stage.

It is here that the three-color footlights and borders are controlled. At the slightest touch the electrician can vary the brightness of the lights.

Foot and border lights are composed of three separate banks of red, blue and white bulbs. Each section of these can be brightened or dimmed separately or together.

Four huge "spots," each consisting of three units, are permanent fixtures in front of the balcony and projection room. These flash thousands of candlepower of light onto the stage.

No open or white lights are used on the interior of the auditorium, all are inclosed in colored shades harmonizing with the wall decorations.

A switchroom is located just off the lobby controlling lights in front sections and outside the building. The flasher for the Palace sign is located in




