Explanation Offered of Process for Producing Talking Films.

What makes the movies talk?
That is the question hundreds of fans are asking and it seems almost as much of a myster; as it was when talking pictures first came into vogue three years ago.

"There are two methods of recording and reproducing, generally referred to as the film and the discussion." he explained.

record consists of a band about one-eighth of an inch wide, called the sound track, which runs down one side of the film and consists of micr scepic lines. The density of these lines depends upon the loudness of the sound, so that the greater the contrast between light and dark lines, the louder will be the sound. In other respects the film resembles the ordinary kind of film.

records that are similar to the best types of phonograph record: except that they are much larger and run at about haif the speed of a phonograph record. It this way it is able to play through a whole reet. The film used with the disc method resembles an ordinary film except that it has special markings at the beginning of a reel to give the starting point for the disc synchronization."

In the classic legends, we have a story concerning an artificia! man molded by Prometheus, who is said to have stolen some of the solar rays, and these he corked in a vial and sealed hermetically. Carrying them back to his sou less monster, he uncorked the vial. and held it close to the statue, whereupon the rays, that stoll retained their activity, percolated through the pores, and set the figure sneezing. Thereupon, Prometheus overjoyed with his success. offered a fervent prayer with wishes for the preservation of his soulless monster. The story contipues that the automaton, having noted this, was particularly careful on all similar occasions to offer a like prayer and wishes in behalf of his descendants, who perpetuated it from father to son in al' their colonies. To this story we owe the origin of that custom, still preserved among the Gentiles, who used to worship the head in sternutation as being the seat of thought and of the senses.

The rabbis declared that God made a general decree that every man living should sneeze but once, and that at the very instant of his sneezing his soul should depart without any previous indisposition. Jacob did not like this precipitated way of passing out of the world, and wishing to settle his family affairs and those of his conscience, he prostrated himself before the Lord, and earnestly entreated the favor of being excepted from this decree. His prayer was granted. and he sneezed without dying. The news spread far and wide until all the princes of the then known' world learned of the fact, and ordered that thereafter sneezing be accompanied with thanksgivings for preservation and good wishes for prolongation of

When Themistocle made sacrifice in his gailey before the battle of Xeres, and one of his aids standing at his right-hand sneezed, the soothsayer Euphrantides foretold the victory of the Greeks and the overthrow of the Persians.

According to Aristotle, the first men were prepossessed with ideas concerning the head as the seat of the soul, and of the intelligence that governed and animated the v hole human system. So they came to look upon sneezing as the most manifest and most seasible operation of the head. Thus it came about that among the Greeks and Romans "Long may , you live!" "May you enjoy health!" and "Jupiler preserve you!" were cupres
