Building 16 Theaters

At the present time Eberson is building theaters in the following citles; four in Chicago, two in New York, and one each in Omaha, Nebranka Flint, Mich., Tampa, Fla., Kalamazoo, Mich., Detroit, Canton, Ohio, Saginaw, Mich., and Grand Island, Mich. Besides these, he is building a 32-story office building in Houston, Texas, which will, upon completion, be one of the finest and most elaborate structures in the world. Another of his big projects under way is the Midway Athletic club, of Miami, Fla. The cost of this building will exceed \$4,000,000.

When asked how he found it possible to carry on his work personally on such a tremendous scale he replied thati t was simply a matter of organization.
