Humason buys building

Hanford real estate broker J. Daniel Humason announced Friday he and his wife, Wilma, have purchased the Hanford Theater building complex at the intersection of Irwin Street and Lacey Boulevard.

The Hanford Theater has been up for sale for several years, but owners were tying the sale to plans to construct a multi-screen theater someplace in the Hanford area.

Humason said his decision to purchase the property was made abruptly three weeks ago when he contacted owners regarding construction of the new theater.

Humason is the agent for a group of local property owners who have been negotiating with theater owners, Theater Properties Inc. of San Francisco, for construction of the new

Humason refused to disclose the amount he paid for the building.

He said his long range plans for the building are undecided, but he will continue the existing rentals. In addition to the theater, the complex houses offices for Kings County Community Action Organization, Cancer Society, barbershop, health food store, record shop, garden shop, and warehouse.

Theater Properties closed the theater portion of the building on Sept. 15.

Humason said until procedures to purchase the property are completed sometime within the next six months he will not make any statement as to his plans for the theater use.

He did say that the theater is "community oriented and I would like it to stay that way, one way or another.
